# Clergy Assistance & Care

On-Call Phone: 443-538-2806

For parish members who need immediate assistance from a clergy person in a time of crisis. The on-call clergy phone is staffed 24/7.

The clergy are available for non-emergency pastoral conversation at various life transitions, offering spiritual guidance and referrals, when appropriate. The following situations are just some of the times when contacting clergy is important:

- You have a question of faith or religious experience
- Before going to the hospital
- A parishioner becomes unable to attend church
- A death occurs, or is imminent
- A baby is born
- The sacrament of baptism, marriage, reconciliation, or Holy Eucharist is desired
- You want to discuss a difficult subject affecting your life
- Drugs or alcohol become a problem for you or someone you love

# Grief Ministries at St. John's

#### At the Time of Death

Clergy provide care, prayers, and guidance for funerals when a parishioner or family member dies. The clergy at St. John's are on-call for pastoral emergencies, with one clergy member available 24 hours a day at 443-538-2806. Please notify clergy prior to an impending death, when possible, and before funeral planning with the funeral home.

### **Bereavement Receptions**

The Bereavement Ministry provides food and service for a reception following a funeral at St. John's. The funeral announcement to the parish invites friends and families to help.

### In the Early Days Following a Death

Stephen Ministers, trained lay care givers, will be assigned to those who would like regular support through the early days of mourning. Grief is different for everyone. The one-on-one weekly support of a Stephen Minister can assist the bereaved in coping with the pain and changes the death of a loved one brings. (Learn more about Stephen Ministry on pages 7-8.)

### Walking the Mourner's Path®

Death and its accompanying grief are part of the human experience. Walking the Mourner's Path is a grief support ministry offered for individuals who have experienced a death of a loved one at least six months prior to the workshop. This ministry consists of 8 consecutive weekly small group workshops led by trained lay facilitators and a member of the clergy. Participants discover Christ-centered support in their grief, tools for moving forward with joyful living, and ways to honor their loved one. Continuing support is offered in quarterly gatherings following completion of the workshop. #### **Unresolved or Complicated Grief**

Unresolved grief or multiple death or trauma can cause emotional pain that lingers and affects our functioning. Those who find they need support with these issues should speak to the clergy about a referral to a local professional counselor.

#### **Grief Booklets**

A series of four booklets is mailed to parishioners who are grieving the death of a loved one. Spaced throughout the first year following a death, these booklets provide insight into the grieving process.

### All Saints Day, November

On All Saints Day, we come together to mourn the dead, affirm hope in the resurrection, and live into the fullness of whom God calls us to be as an individual and as the church. We reflect on the promises of eternity and give space to remember and honor the lives of those who are no longer a part of the community in the flesh. During the Offertory ceremony, attendees are invited to place a picture of their loved one on a table of remembrance near the altar, tie a ribbon on a remembrance tree, and light a votive candle. We also remember departed loved ones in the Prayers of the People and in our service bulletins.

# Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry is an essential, front-line pastoral care at St. John's. The parish has 14 Stephen Ministers, men and women of various ages and backgrounds, all who share a



passion for bringing Christ's love and care to others. Trained to listen, care, encourage, and provide emotional and spiritual support, confidentiality and compassion are the foundation of their ministry. Providing one-to-one spiritual caring for our parishioners, Stephen Ministers meet regularly with their care receiver to support them through difficult times—through grief, in acute illness or a new diagnosis, divorce, the stress of parenthood, and other life transitions. This caring relationship lasts as long as the need for care arises.

Stephen Ministry has been present at St. John's for more than 25 years. In the past year, Stephen Ministers at St. John's have collectively spent hundreds of contact hours serving care receivers. Because of its confidential nature, Stephen Ministry is a quiet ministry, actively supporting parishioners behind the scenes. Parishioners are encouraged to contact clergy or one of our Stephen Ministry leaders when a need arises and connection to a Stephen Minister might be beneficial. Stephen Ministry multiplies blessings throughout the church and community:

- Christ's commandment to "love one another" is carried out in a powerful and practical way.
- The church has a team of gifted, trained, and committed lay caregivers ready to minister to hurting people.
- Laypeople nurture and use their gifts in meaningful ministry, growing spiritually as they serve others.
- People who are hurting have a caring, Christian presence to provide emotional and spiritual support, and someone to walk alongside them.

### **Meals Ministry**

Nutritious food heals and food shared creates community. That is why the stories of Jesus' ministry were often set around a table. St. John's Meals Ministry extends the



hospitable love of Jesus by providing meals to those who:


- Experience a crisis
- Undergo surgery
- Are ill
- Have a new baby

Recipients are brought to the attention of the Meals Ministry Team coordinator, by the clergy, church staff, and fellow parishioners. After speaking with recipients regarding dietary concerns, preferences and allergies, the coordinator organizes meal preparation and delivery. The team prepares and delivers meals, discerning what works best for each recipient's situation. Soups-stewscasseroles, vegetarian-vegan, gluten-free, low salt or spice, easy to swallow, etc. We prepare it all!

### **Clicks of Comfort: The Prayer Shawl Ministry**

The Prayer Shawl Ministry began in 2006 by late parishioner Gudrun Huden. Since then, *nearly 1,000* hand-crafted prayer shawls have been distributed to parishioners and friends. Parishioners who are sick, have celebrated a birth, or

The Prayer Chain leaders, inspired by the Holy Spirit, prayerfully put into words the intercessions, petitions, and thanksgivings of those who seek a specific prayer. Written by leaders of the Prayer

Chain, these beautiful, directed prayers are then distributed to those who commit to daily prayer for those in need. The Prayer Chain is *distinct and different* from prayer requests made to the church office for inclusion in the weekend worship bulletins.
